### EXCEPTIONAL PERFORMANCE BY PROF MIKE HENNING OF UJ

It recently became known that Prof Michael Anthony (Mike) Henning \* 19 March 1964 with genealogical number a2.b7.c5.d7.e2.f1.g2. in the Henning Family Chronicle was honoured with one of the most prestigious academic awards.

The South African National Research Foundation (NRF) awarded an A-grade to Prof Michael Henning of the University of Johannesburg for the third time. This time in the coveted A1 category, the highest rating of the NRF.

The NRF awards A1 ratings to researchers who are internationally recognized by all judges as leading scholars in their field, due to the high quality and wide impact of their recent outputs.

An A1 rating is a rare honour reserved for the most prominent researchers. There are only 117 researchers in all disciplines in South Africa who have received an A rating,

so Prof Mike with his A1 rating is at the top of these top researchers in South Africa.

He has published approximately 500 papers in international mathematics journals, including more than 100 papers in the prestigious journal "Discrete Mathematics".

*"I am delighted that I retained my NRF A rating for the third rating cycle and received an increased rating, namely an A1 rating this time. Mathematical research is inherently unpredictable. One can literally work on a math problem for decades without making any progress. That is why I am grateful that I have made enough progress to justify an A1 rating,"* Mike said.

Prof Henning has been invited as a guest speaker at several international conferences in the USA, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Hungary, Poland, Slovakia and Slovenia. He works with graph theorists from many countries. "The opportunity to work with world leaders in mathematics is very valuable. Collaboration with other mathematicians has greatly improved the research experience for me. I would only have achieved a small fraction of the research successes if I could not travel personally and work with my research fellows in different parts of the world", the professor said.

Prof Henning's research is in the field of discrete mathematics and deals mainly with structures in graph theory, including dominance theory in graphs - an area in which he has an established footprint. He also conducts research on other topics such as adaptations, dyes, independence in graphs and transversal in hypergraphs. The interaction between total dominance in graphs and transversal in hypergraphs has been a focus of his research for the past 15 years. This led to two Springer books - "Total Domination in Graphs" and "Transversals in Linear

Uniform Hypergraphs", both co-authored with one of his most important collaborators, Professor Anders Yeo of the University of Southern Denmark.

Mike was born in Graaff-Reinet as the second of four children of Prof Cosmo Grenville Henning and his wife Joyce (born Roebuck), but went to school in Pretoria and Westville - grades 1 to 7 at Waterkloof Primary School, grades 8 to 9 at Pretoria Boys High School and grades 10 to 12 at Westville Boys High School. He studied at the University of Natal from 1981 to 1989 and obtained a PhD degree in Mathematics.

In athletics, he competed in cross-country, road races and track at provincial level. He also played provincial chess.

He worked at the University of KwaZulu-Natal from January 1991 to April 2010 and then moved to the

University of Johannesburg from May 2010 as a research professor in mathematics.

Prof Mike and his wife, Anne have two children, John Anthony \* 8-5-1998 and Alicen Joy \* 23-8-2000

## Pleasant childhood memories



**The pleasant childhood memories of b6.c4.d3.e5.f2.g3.h1. Ansie van Zyl (formerly Steyn, born Henning) \*4-5-1958 of her grand parents and "Aunt Ous"**

b6.c4.d3.e5.f2.g3.h1. Ansie van Zyl (formerly Steyn, born Henning) \* 4-5-1958 lives in a "grandmother's apartment" at her only son, Andries Marthinus Steyn's house in Witbank.

Ansie told us the beautiful story of her grandfather Willem and grandmother Anna Henning and her father's eldest sister, Anna Margaretha. Her father, Andries Jacobus Henning \* 11-9-1920 was the third of four children of Willem Frederik Henning \* 19-4-1891 and his wife Anna Susanna (born Van Wyk) \* 1-12-1895.

Grandpa Willem worked on the railways in Heidelberg, but was also a sub-farmer on the farm Vaaldraai, Frankfort, where cattle and grain were farmed. Later he bought four plots next to each other in Heidelberg. On the first plot he built a house for himself and

grandmother Anna. On the second yard he planted maize. On the third plot his youngest daughter, Maria Magdalena and her husband built a house and on the fourth plot Grandpa Willem laid an orchard.

Although Grandpa Willem worked for the railways, he also served in the Union Defence Force during World War I and was even the champion marksman of the Northern Command.

Grandpa Willem and his family still had a "longdrop" small house. When grandmother Anna became seriously ill with stomach and liver cancer, Ansie's father, Kootjie, built them a proper bathroom.

Grandpa and Grandma had a big pantry, with big tin cans full of flour and sugar, as well as shelves full of canned fruit.

There was a large rainwater tank next to the house and a real, real wagon house with large gates on which all the grandchildren jumped and rode along when it was opened.

Grandfather Willem Frederik and grandmother Anna Susanna Henning's four children all had interesting names, namely Anna Margaretha \* 12-2-1918 was called "Aunt Ous" by all the children, Pieter Jacob was "Uncle Jaap" or "Uncle Japie", then Ansie's father, Andries Jacobus's nickname was "Kootjie" and lastly Maria Magdalena born 24-3-1927 who was the youngest was "Aunt Sus".

Father Andries Henning was married to Catharina Elizabeth (born Swanepoel) \* 4-8-1929. She was previously married to Petrus Lourens Scott and Andries (Kootjie) Henning was therefore her second husband. She also had children with her first husband, who were, of course, half-siblings of Ansie.

Ansie and her sisters always rode with Aunt Ous. Aunt Sis and her husband, who lived just next to grandparents, also joined the rally. These were wonderful days for the children to have had such wonderful grandparents and an aunt like Aunt Ous.

Ansie was the eldest of three daughters that Andries (Kootjie) had with mother Catharina. The other two daughters' names were Elize and Rita.

Ansie says that "Aunt Ous" (Anna Margaretha) and her husband, Isak Daniël Bosman lived in Vanderbijlpark where he and Ansie's father, Kootjie both worked for YSKOR. Uncle Isak and Aunt Ous were childless. She was a very gentle person. When her husband, Isak, spoke of her to her brothers, he always spoke of "your oldest sis." Hence her nickname - Aunt Ous.

Ansie believes that Aunt Ous would have been a wonderful mother if she and her husband had children. Ansie also says that she would have liked to have been a daughter of Aunt Ous, because she did everything that a mother, from a child's point of view, had to do.

Ansie and her younger sisters, Elize and Rita took turns visiting Uncle Isaac and Aunt Ous on weekends. Then they slept on a single bed. Aunt Ous' house was always painfully neat with clean floors that were always rubbed shiny. Up to the drain at the outside taps, was polished red and rubbed shiny. Uncle Isak did not garden. The yard was clean, but no garden or flowers. His garage was his sanctuary. He had cupboards full of tools. Each tool had its place.

On Saturday mornings, Aunt Ous always spoiled the children with something delicious, such as koeksisters, while their father, Andries (or Kootjie) and Uncle Isak stood and drank a brandy in the garage. He was not allowed to keep liquor in the house. Ansie remembers that Uncle Isak always sent one of the children to fetch the men some ice water for their drinks.

At Christmas, Uncle Isak and Aunt Ous, and her father, with his family, as well as Uncle Japie (always alone) drove from Vanderbijlpark to Heidelberg, to spend the day with Grandpa Willem and Grandma Anna.

## News from Canada

We received an interesting letter from Ontario, Canada from Jan-Louis Henning \* 7-5-1992. His genealogical number in the Henning Family Chronicle is a2.b5.c2.d13.e1.f3.g1.h3.i3. He says their family moved to Canada in 1996, when he was four years old.

Today, Jan-Louis is an Electrical-Mechanical Engineering Officer in the Canadian Army. He can still speak Afrikaans, but his English is better, because he has been living in an English-speaking country since the age of four.

Jan-Louis says that he would like to see his descendants one day, if they trace their ancestors, see that their ancestors had a proud history in South Africa.

His father, also Jan Louis Henning \* 15-12-1958 and his mother, Christina Hendrina (born Roodt) \* 7-5-1959 were married on 17 December 1982, while his father was still studying medicine. They have three children, namely Merissa \* 16-9-1989 (she is the only one of the three children already married - to Harrison James Pyke), Janneke \* 24-1-1991 and Jan-Louis \* 7-5-1992 .

His father qualified as a doctor in 1983

During the first years of his career, Jan Louis senior regularly heard from colleagues who went to work in Canada. Their stories were interesting and spoke of a world he did not know.

In 1990 he started specializing in Orthopaedics. Towards the end of his term as Clinical Assistant, he started looking at his options when he qualified

as a specialist. He heard about a good friend who was in practice in Canada and started exploring the idea of going to Canada for a two-year period with the plan to return to South Africa.

By an interesting coincidence, he obtained his friend's contact information. He was then looking for someone to go into practice with him. Everything fell into place and in January 1996 he joined his friend in their practice in Yorkton, Saskatchewan. They worked together in practice for five years before Jan Louis moved to Owen Sound in Ontario where he has been practising for the past twenty years. Since then, this Henning family still lives in Canada.

Dr Jan Louis (Snr.)'s father, Dr Pieter Hendrik Henning \* 21-8-1929 was also a specialist doctor - in psychiatry. He was the Chief Director of Mental Health at the

Department of Health in South Africa. He came into the spotlight when he participated as assessor / adviser in the trial of Dimitri Tsafendas, the person who killed the then Prime Minister, Dr H F Verwoerd.

Around 1981/82, while Olivier Henning was still collecting data for his first book on the descendants of the Henning progenitor, Pieter Hendrik Henning, he visited this Dr Pieter Henning one day to determine who his ancestors were and to get his family's data.

Dr Pieter Henning and his wife Maria Christina Elizabeth (born Olivier) had four sons, Pieter Hendrik, born 2-4-1955; Ignatius Wilhelm born 14-7-1956; Jan Louis born 15-12-1958 and Ockert Jacobus born 26-6-1960.

Until recently, we only had basic data from all four of these boys' families, but with the help of Jan-Louis (Jnr.), we are now recording all four families in full. Olivier was fortunate enough to be able to completely reconstruct the ancestry of these families and take on board their fascinating history that spans nine generations.

## **Death of a Henning who bravely fought against illegal expropriation of farms**

a2.b1.c6.d14.e2.f4. Pieter Bernard Henning, born 5 May 1940, or Peter Henning as he was called, died on 28 November 2020. He was a son of Johannes Stephanus Henning and his wife, Beatrice Cawood Smith. Father Johannes moved with his parents to the farm Sweetwaters, Louis Trichardt district, in 1912, where he left deep footprints in the agricultural community.

Peter was born at Elim Hospital, Louis Trichardt, and grew up with his older brothers, Poek and John, on the farm Sweetwaters, Louis Trichardt.

He attended Louis Trichardt Primary School, after which he matriculated at St John's College in Johannesburg. He spent the next three years at the University of Pretoria (Tuks) studying law. He discontinued his studies to take over the dairy at Sweetwaters.

He applied to take over one of the sugar farms in Rhodesia. His application was successful and in 1965 he received a sugar farm with a £8000 guarantee provided by his father. In November of that year, Mr Ian Smith, Prime Minister of Rhodesia, unilaterally declared his country independent (UDI) and his sugar quota was reduced,

due to the sanctions imposed by the outside world. In 1967, he plowed over half of the new sugarcane for cash crops. Four years later, he and his brother, John, bought the neighbours' farm in a 50/50 partnership.

In the same year the bush war in the Southeastern Lowveld of Rhodesia worsened and in the latter part of 1977 a large joint operational command post was set up at Buffalo Range airport. Peter was appointed as a flight lieutenant in charge of the Air Force Reserve.

In 1979 he and his family moved back to Louis Trichardt to try to convince the South African government not to expropriate the family farm, Sweetwaters, Louis Trichardt. At the same time he purchased Masapas Ranch 80 km north of Chiredzi (Zimbabwe) to farm with cattle. It then became a game farm.

After a two-year drought in the Lowveld and after their three children had completed their schooling, Peter moved back to

Chiredzi in 1994, where he played an important role in the founding and early development of the Save Valley Conservancy, as he owned the largest private game conservation area in the region.

In 2000 the farm attacks started and finally in 2004 he was chased away by a group of squatters (Mugabe terrorists). After many successful court cases, the family managed to stay in the homestead until 2009, when they were forced to return to South Africa or be arrested because he and his family remained "illegally" in their own home. The family returned to Louis Trichardt and fought from afar for justice and returned to the Chiredzi Magistrate's Court three times every six weeks to stay in the homestead. In December 2012, he was sentenced to \$ 100 or two weeks in prison.

Peter tirelessly continued to fight for justice and waited until his death for the outcome of a court case involving farmers, with the help of Afriforum against the South African government (over the expropriation of his farm in Zimbabwe) at the High Court in Pretoria. The outcome is still pending, and the family trusts that a favorable verdict will be rendered.

He died peacefully in the early hours of Saturday morning, November 28, 2020, after a brief, fierce battle with pancreatic cancer.

He and his brother Arthur (Poek) are married to two Mackinnon sisters. A memorial service was held on Saturday 5 December at 11:00 in the Agapé Church in Louis Trichardt. He is survived by his wife Moraig Henning, son Greig Henning, daughters Liesl Biehn and Bronwyn Henning and granddaughter Caitlin Biehn.

## More Hennings excel Abroad

Being League Secretary of the Henning Family League and editor of the Ons Haantjie newsletter means that if such a person wants to do this life task properly, he or she must keep an eye on all the media platforms every day, because although the Henning family is actually a relatively small family, with only about 4 000 members (including inlaws) something happens almost every day of the year that should be noted: Henning babies are born, a Henning dies or marries, or performs on some area, or something - positive or negative - happens to one of our people and so we keep our hand on the proud history of this family.

When I took note of Prof Mike Henning's exceptional performance on the News 24 platform during February 2021 - our editorial on page 1 - I was fortunately able to get in touch with him quickly.

Prof Mike's father, Cosmo Grenville Henning, born 20-4-1932, was also an extremely capable academic. He obtained several academic qualifications, the most important of which were the D Phil (UP), M Mus (UP) and F.T.C.L. He was an

outstanding cultural historian, musicologist and archivist.

From his pen appeared, among others, the research work "Graaff-Reinet 1786-1886 A Cultural History". He also contributed to the South African Music Encyclopedia and the South African Biographical Dictionary.

He served as the Director, Documentation Center of the University of Durban-Westville, where he was responsible for the establishment of an archive, documentation centre and museum for the South African Indian community.

Prof Cosmo Henning and his wife, Joyce Roebuck were married in England during December 1961 and they had three sons and a daughter: Paul Roebuck Henning \* 9-4-1963; Michael Anthony (Mike) Henning \* 19-3-1964; Adrian Grenville Henning \* 2-7-1971 and their daughter, Susan Claire Henning \* 24-12-1972. Apart from Prof Mike's family who have now been documented in full, Mike also brought me in contact with his brother Adrian Grenville who lives in the USA, and it is clear that Adrian also performed exceptionally well.

Adrian attended Westville Junior and senior Primary Schools and matriculated from Westville Boys High School in 1990. After school he completed the following tertiary activities and studies: 1. He qualified as an Electronic Engineer (majoring in Avionics) from the Tswane University of Tehnology; 2. Private pilot's licence; 3.



Bachelor of Commerce Honours from University of Natal; 4. Chartered Accountancy (CA AUS, not active); Certified Public Accountant (CPA ASA NC Active).

He worked as an avionics engineer. He also worked in Public Accounting at Pricewaterhouse Coopers and Ernst & Young and at Wells Fargo Bank.

During 2005 Adrian and his wife, Janice (still unmarried) both worked for Pricewaterhouse Coopers and were seconded by their employer to branches in the USA. Janice was seconded to Charlotte, North Carolina and Adrian seconded to Minneapolis, Minnesota. During 2007 Adrian was transferred to Charlotte NC, where he and Janice met. They became citizens in 2018 and lived most of the time in Charlotte, NC. At present Adrian is a VP Audit at Wells Fargo bank, one of the largest banks in the USA.

At school Adrian played tennis, hockey, squash and participated in athletics.

# Deaths

**Petrus (known as Pierre) Henning \* 17-6-1950** died on 4 March 2021 in Pringle Bay.

Pierre apparently died of a heart attack or a blood clot through a stent above his stomach. He had an appointment the morning of 4 March at an auditing firm in Kleinmond in connection with a transaction that had been delayed for years and which upset him a lot. On the way home he got angina and could not get out of the car when he stopped in the driveway.

A local ambulance rushed him to the hospital in Somerset West. After his wife,

Andréé, waited in suspense for more than an hour and a half, the medics let her know that they could do nothing for him.

Pierre was a colourful character and a great storyteller. He also had a serious and responsible side. For example, he was very concerned and critical about what was happening in the political field in South Africa.

He had a special love for Afrikaans music and was good friends with quite a few well-known artists, including Anton Goosen and Lucas Maree. Due to lack of space in this newsletter, we will publish parts of an article he wrote on 20 January 2021 about his involvement with Afrikaans artists in the next newsletter. It is as if Pierre knew that his time was short, for just a little over two weeks after writing this article, he passed away.

Pierre completed his military service at the Air Force Gymnasium and after his basic training they placed him at the Waterkloof Air Force Base, where he worked on the maintenance of communications equipment of the Buccaneer bombers.

After his service he obtained a BSc (Building Management) degree at Tukkies, but he soon realized that the day-to-day duties of a building manager did not suit his temperament. He then went on to study and obtained a BSc degree in Quantity Surveying. He was happier in that role.

In 1978, he and his brother Neels partnered to make small mechanical parts for Armscor. At that time, Armscor produced about 30 000 R4 assault rifles per year for the army, mainly due to the border war on the northern border of Namibia. They were very proud that they could make a contribution to keep the communist wolf away from SA's door. Items they mass-produced included the R4's bead and lightning breaker. They also made components for some other weapons, such as the Bren machine gun. It

was a small business and they could only afford smaller automatic lathes and one small milling machine.

They thought of making parts for artillery weapons, but could never get that far. With the recession of 1982, the orders of Armscor dried up completely and they had to close the business. Neels then went to work for Grinel (Transmission) and Pierre and family moved to Durban, where he got a job as a quantity surveyor and his wife Andréé (who has a master's degree in Mathematics) got a job as a Mathematics lecturer at a local university.

During their stay in Natal, he developed an interest in kayaks. He was involved part-time with a small firm that built the boats. He himself built one or two out of wood that was beautiful to behold.

They lived there until their retirement in 2015, when they moved to Pringle Bay.

A few years ago, Pierre got cancer in his right foot, and they had to put the foot down. He then got a prosthetic foot with which he struggled a lot. Pierre also had problems with atherosclerosis. About three / four years ago he had three heart bypasses, which apparently lasted only two years. So, Pierre later had to get stents in his heart, but that was not enough because he had to use medication for angina regularly. The end result for Pierre was the heart attack in which he died.

Pierre's wife, Andréé, casually remarked that he was such a talented man. Difficult... but he enriched her life endlessly. It's like he knew he had to get things done in the last few months. The article about his artist friends, which we will publish in the August newsletter, also testifies to this.

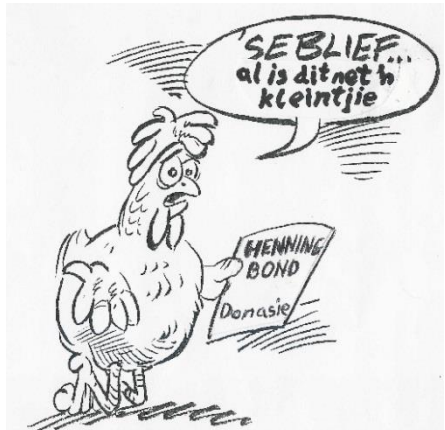
